Woman Suffrage

Before 1869, the right to vote in public elections for women citizens in the United States did not exist. Increased interest then led to individual states adopting voting rights, but protests against voting discrimination based on sex frequently met with brutal responses and imprisonment of suffragists.

The proposed 19th amendment to the US Constitution - The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation. - was introduced in Congress in 1878, and finally passed on June 4, 1919. Ratification was required of 36 states (3/4 of the total). By August, 1920, 35 had ratified, and it was being considered by the Tennessee legislature. A critical vote on August 18, in which Harry Burn, a legislator from McMinn County changed his vote from against to in favor, finally provided the 36th state required. It officially became part of the Constitution on August 26, 1920.

A new US Postage stamp will be issued this August to commemorate the ratification of the 19th Amendment.


