

### **Stamp of the Month**

This month's stamp has a strong local interest to East Tennesseans. It is the Tennessee Valley Authority commemorative (Scott 2042), issued May 18, 1993 on the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of President Franklin Roosevelt's signing legislation that created the TVA. An

## 20th Century Fancy Cancels - A Collector's delight

In the early part of this century, problems occurred in the registered mail system. Letters that were registered were often mixed into the regular mail, thus negating the value of extra money postal patrons were paying for the registry service and exposing registered mail to theft. In 1924, the post office issued a stern regulation that said registered letters were not to have the name of the town on their face, the stamps to be canceled with a set of concentric rings.

In 1928 several collectors stamp began to make cancellers that were keyed to the names of 4th class rural post offices. They would then mail the cancellers to the postmasters and request that the "fancy" cancel be instead of the "dull" cancellers on envelopes sent registered mail. postmasters For who were willing to accommodate collectors it meant

selling more stamps, and the 4<sup>th</sup> class postmasters' salaries were based on their stamp revenue. Over the next 8 years, this practice spread to over 1000 different post offices, with the postmasters themselves creating many of the "fancy" cancellers. By 1936 the officials in Washington decided this was all against regulations and the fancy cancels were officially outlawed.

Arkansas had many 4<sup>th</sup> class post offices, some with names that could easily be converted to fancy cancels (Bear, Forty Four, Tomato, Turkey, Fox, Hand, and several others). "Fancy" cancel covers exist from about 15 different







Arkansas Post Offices, some with variations or different cancels from the same post office. Pictured here are several examples. These covers exist in very small numbers (in some cases less than 10 are known) and are highly prized for topical exhibits.

### **New Stamps and New Rates for 2009**

By the time you receive this newsletter, the USPS will have issued four new commemorative stamps in 2009. As I sit here on January 6, one of these, the Alaska statehood 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary has already appeared, but I



haven't seen one in the mail, yet. Others to follow in the next few days will be the Lunar New Year – Year

of the Ox and stamps honoring Oregon statehood and the birth of Edgar Alan Poe. If you want to see the latest press releases on 2009 stamps, visit the USPS web site – <u>www.usps.com</u> – and click on the "About USPS & News" tab at the upper right.

Later this year, we will have more of the state flags coil series, which I have enjoyed collecting on cover. The Hawaii statehood stamp will be another treat to

look for in the months to come. But something to be aware of is the planned postal rate hike that should take



effect this year. The letter rate will rise to 44 cents, along with costs of other types of mail.

Stay tuned for future announcements about the new rates and the stamps they will bring.

### **President's Column**

It amazes me how things in our lives come together at various stages in the journey. Our hobby of stamp collecting is no exception. As a high school student in the late 1960's, I was licensed as WA3MCL, an Advanced Class Amateur Radio operator. I spent many nights huddled over the glowing tubes in my transmitter talking on Morse code and voice with other hams and listening to short-wave programs broadcast from all over the world. I followed the war in Viet Nam through international eyes and was interested in the different viewpoints that were expressed.

Although I still have my license, I don't spent much time talking on the radio any longer. I have, however, kept up my interest in listening to short-wave broadcasts. Last year I found a way to tie in my interest in stamps with my listening habit. Saturday night often finds me relaxing with my stamp collection and listening to the short-wave. Imagine my surprise when I heard a program on stamps broadcast by Radio Havana Cuba! Since then, I am a regular listener.

Radio Havana broadcasts on the frequency of 6140 megahertz in the evenings. Between 9:00 and 9:30 PM they air a program called "The World of Stamps" dealing with stamp collecting and topics from all around the world. (The show is repeated at 10PM.) The exciting thing is that at the end of each broadcast they offer a test question for listeners based on the information given. Answer the question right, and you receive a packet of stamps from Cuba. The stamps are different each week, enabling a collector to get a good start on a Cuba collection. For those who can't receive short-wave, I am sure that Radio Havana streams their broadcast on the internet at the same time. You can email them at radiohc@enet.cu.

# **Knoxville Philatelic Society Meeting – January 6, 2009**

The KPS January meeting was held at the Tennessee Valley Unitarian Universalist Church. There were 17 members and visitors present. Jim Pettway introduced new members Joe Kirken and Paul Wennermark, and visitor Stephen Floyd and his parents, Don and Cheri Floyd. The meeting was called to order by president Roy Row at 7:15 PM.

Russ Haese presented a very interesting program on the processes used to make the paper for stamps, definitions of terms for the various papers, and how watermarks are made and how to look for them to identify your stamps. Russ also passed around several exhibit pages showing stage color printings of German stamps.

In the business meeting Roy Row announced that Charlie Wade would give the program next month on grading of stamps. The minutes were approved as published, the treasurer's report showed a balance of \$8243.91. Thomas Lane has renewed the club's CD at 3.9%.

There was discussion of Jim Cate's nomination for APS Director-at-Large. Tom Broadhead moved and Thomas Lane seconded that we second his nomination, and the motion passed.

Knoxpex 2009 chair Gerald Schroedl reviewed points of the show: (1) Thomas Lane – the banner can be mounted at the hotel, (2) Tom Broadhead – publicity is underway, the new Lincoln stamps will be issued Feb. 9, the Post Office is lined up, the show cancel has been approved, (3) Jim Pettway - 13 dealers are confirmed, (4) Bruce Roberts – exhibits are needed. Gerald announced that he is arranging with Lincoln Memorial University to exhibit copies of items from its museum. Russ Haese announced

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that the Tennessee Germany Philatelic Society has disbanded. Mike Kauffman will have surgery tomorrow. The meeting was adjourned at 8:45.

### KPS Board meeting – December 30, 2008

The meeting was called to order at 6:04 PM with 15 members and visitors present. Bruce Roberts said that we can place a KPS label on the folder containing the *American Philatelist*, which the club donates to the library. Our web site could invite new visitors and inquiries about the club. We have been asked to second a nomination for Jim Cate to be an APS Director-at-Large. We will vote on that at the regular meeting.

Jim Pettway discussed the possible participation of the local postcard club in Knoxpex 2009. We will issue a special invitation to them for the show and ask if any of their members will give a program at our club in the future. Ralph Dinwiddie announced that the CD of past KPS newsletters is not yet completed and is lacking some issues. Thomas Lane reported that the club's CD (\$) has been renewed at an excellent rate.

Jim Pettway indicated that we have 13 dealers for Knoxpex 2009, layout and arrangements are in the works. Bruce Roberts will have the APS exhibitors guide for the most popular exhibit award. Gerald Schroedl reported that exhibit entry forms and the auction forms may be found on the web site. Ralph Dinwiddie's cancel design has been approved. It was suggested that we print 120 cacheted envelopes for the show. Tom Broadhead and Jim Pettway reported on publicity in *Linn's* and *American Philatelist*, web sites, future public service announcements, and a sign at the motel. Roy Row will check with Bill Muenzer's son about security. Jim Pettway will ask dealers to donate items or coupons for door prizes, and club members may donate items. We would like to give a door prize every hour.

# The Schwarzdruck (Black Print) Issues of the former German Democratic Republic

Black Prints are black and white (gray-scale) printings of a release level stamp(s) with the stamp value or franking crossed through, making them invalid for postal use. The stamp(s) in a Black Print are not perforated and are printed on ungummed regular or presentation folder paper.

A total of twenty-four Black Prints were issued by the East German (DDR) Postal Authority from 1977 through 1990, when the East & West Germany postal authorities were combined. Black Prints were printed for miniature souvenir sheets, stamp sets and for combination strips (with labels). Black Prints were issued for sale at first day of issue / stamp exhibition ceremonies at a rate of one Black Print issue per year, except for 1988, in which there were two issues. The event sale price for these ranged from 2-4 Marks (\$1.00 - \$2.00) each. Of these fifteen printings, four were also included in the hard bound Year Book releases. Of the remaining nine Black Print issues, seven were made available one in each of the 1984-1990 Year Book publications and two were included only in special philatelic presentation folders. Black Print quantities printed ranged from about 50,000 for the two presentation folder sales, 27,000 – 60,000 for the Year Book only inclusion sales, 68,000 – 190,000 for the first day of issue stamp event sales and 95,000 – 236,000 for the combined stamp event and Year Book inclusion sales.

Although Black Prints are specialized items and are not often seen at dealer bourses, occasionally they can be found on *eBay*, although often not properly identified. Each of the East Germany Black Prints is identified in the *Michel Deutschland-Spezial* catalog, but they are not found in the *Standard Scott* catalog. The Black Print included in this newsletter is of the July 22, 1986, "9<sup>th</sup> Youth Stamp Exhibition, Berlin" combination strip of a semipostal stamp + label + regular postage stamp, shown below with the corresponding Black Print.



### The UK Machin Icon

What is the most widely used image in the world? It is the portrait of Great Britain's Queen Elizabeth II which has appeared on over 200 billion stamps in the United Kingdom and the British Commonwealth. The design was the

result of a plaster bust of the Queen (shown at right) produced by Arnold Machin, an accomplished sculptor. This design was immediately recognized as a classic, lasting for over 40 years and shows no signs of stopping. This has resulted in hundreds of varieties

for stamp collectors and devotees to study.

Arnold Machin was born in 1911 and from an early age showed talent as an artist. He became an apprentice pottery designer at 14, and at the Derby School of Arts he refined his talent as a sculptor. This was followed by studies at the Royal College of Art in London. He was also a bit of a political activist. As a conscientious objector during World War II he served a period in prison in 1943. And in the same year he

chained himself to a gas lamp post in an act of protest against materialism.

From the accession of Elizabeth II in 1952 until 1967, a three-quarter profile portrait of her photographed by Dorothy Wilding appeared on all British and commonwealth stamps. But in the mid-1960s this design was thought to be antiquated. In a recommendation to the Postmaster General in January 1965, the Stamp Advisory Committee was strongly in favor of a new version of the Queen's head. They recommended the design be a profile and be engraved from a photograph. In November of that year Arnold Machin and four other artists were asked to submit ideas for a new design. From the competition Machin was designated to proceed with his recommendation and was paid 4,500 pounds which is the equivalent of about \$100,000 in today's value.

The Machin design was first based on a photograph taken by Lord Snowdon, the Queen's brother-in-law. Machin's design candidates included portraits of the Queen

with and without a tiara, set in a variety of frames, some of which were very ornate. In contrast to the Wilding design, he declined to use the familiar symbols representing the four countries of the United Kingdom and the







words "Postage & Revenue". He also recommended the stamp be adorned with else other nothing than the denomination. After other images were reviewed the design was finalized with the Queen describing it as "admirable". However there was some controversy when Sir John Betjeman, British Poet Laureate, suggested it made the Oueen "look a bit sexy."

The Machin design was first released on June 5, 1967 on the 4d deep sepia, 1s bluish-violet and 1s 9d orange and black postage stamps. The Queen, who was herself a stamp collector, expressed her preference for the color of the 4d, so it would closely resemble the Penny Black. Sadly this color was unsatisfactory to use with the phosphor signal used in automated letterfacing equipment. The color of the 4d was changed to bright vermilion in early 1969.

In the mid-eighties, the Queen came under pressure to replace the Machin head with a more modern design. After reviewing five new designs, she relayed the message to the Royal Mail that she did not favor a change just for change sake. She was "very content with the Machin design" and it is planned to use this design for the rest of her reign. Arnold Machin died on March 9, 1999 but his iconic design will remain a classic in postal history.



Each of the Lincoln bicentennial stamps shows a portrait derived from a photo of Lincoln. Photo reproductions of these portraits and the accompanying stamps will be on exhibit at Knoxpex 2009. They include the earliest known photo of Lincoln, and the image at right. The photo from which the Knoxpex cachet and stamp below are taken was made by Alexander Gardner on November 8, 1863, eleven days before Lincoln delivered the Gettysburg Address.



Ralph Dinwiddie's spectacular cachet and cancel will be featured at Knoxpex 2009 on March 7-8. Cachets will include examples of all four of the Lincoln bicentennial stamps. Single cachets with stamp and cancel will sell for \$2.00, and the complete set of four will be \$6.00.

### The First Scout Stamps

In 1907, Robert Baden-Powell, a decorated British veteran of the Boer War founded the **Scouting Movement**, which in the U.S. was incorporated as the **Boy Scouts of America** by William D. Boyce on February 8, 1910. Baden-Powell, together with his wife and sister founded the **Girl Guides Movement** in 1910 to provide similar opportunities to young women, and the **Girl Scouts of the USA** was founded by Juliet Gordon Low on March 12, 1912. It is exciting to note that both of these organizations will celebrate their founding in the United States in the next few years.

How did the idea of scouting begin? It actually predates by almost a decade Baden-Powell's Scouting Movement. During the late 1800's, a bitter conflict between British colonists and the Boers, who were descendants of Dutch colonists, erupted in southern Africa. Philatelically, this is a fascinating area of study, because there were several independent states established by the Boers, all of which ultimately were incorporated into the Union of South Africa following the British victory. The origin of the idea of scouting for young men and the first stamps related to that all come from the Boer siege of a small town called Mafeking.

Baden-Powell and 1,500 troops had been sent to Mafeking, a key town on the railroad north from Capetown, as a diversion to attract Boer troops away from an invasion of Natal colony. In other words, the siege, which lasted

from October 14, 1899 to May 16, 1900, was planned by the besieged! The uncertain thing about sieges, however, is their duration, and stamps for use in and around Mafeking were in short supply, as were currency banknotes.

Initially, this problem was solved by overprinting stocks of existing stamps for the Cape of Good Hope colony and the Bechuanaland Protectorate (overprinted on British stamps) with the words "MAFEKING BESIEGED." Those were used only as long as existing stocks permitted, and by April, 1900 there was a need to print stamps. The scarcity of materials resulted in the






ingenious use of glass printing plates and chemically treated ordinary papers that produced both stamps and a required banknote by what we now know as the "blueprint" process.

Three different stamps were printed in sheets of 12 (shown below at right), and used examples are all postmarked in April or May. A large and small format, featured Colonel Baden-Powell. The third showed a 12-year old military cadet, Warner Goodyear, riding a bicycle used for mail delivery within the town and nearby surrounding areas. The Mafeking cadet corps, including boys as young as 9, conducted many basic and essential services









Initially, Queen Victoria was "not amused" that postage stamps had been issued without her portrait, but she later knighted Baden-Powell. The energetic cadets displayed heroism and fortitude during the siege and were part of Baden-Powell's inspiration to found the Scouting Movement.

## New Machins Will Be Hard To Remove

Recent articles in *Linn's Stamp News* gave warning of problems for stamp soakers that might even eclipse the problems found with current U.S. stamps. Royal Mail, the British government postal agency, announced new security measures on its Machin definitive stamps. For more information about the history of this beautiful stamp issue, see Charlie Wade's article in the March 2009 issue of the KPS Newsletter.

In addition to security overprints on the Machin definitives, Royal Mail added another feature – cuved cuts in the stamp paper designed to make stamp removal next to impossible without tearing.





These images are from the web site of Ian Norvic, who has a great discussion and illustrations of the new features – <u>www.norvic-philatelics.co.uk</u>. On the first class stamp, the cuts can be seen just above and below the "Is" and on the one pound stamp, the cuts are centered above and below the "I." Issued beginning on February 17, the cuts appear on the most common stamps (1st and 2nd denominated) and on the pound values.

There is hope, and the Machin Mania blog site – <a href="http://machinmania.blogspot.com">http://machinmania.blogspot.com</a> – has postings that suggest Ronson brand ligher fluid may work.

### The U.S. Recognizes Scouting

Last month, I discussed the origin of the Scouting Movement in Britain and its influence on the founding of the Boy Scouts of America by William D. Boyce in 1910 and the Girl Scouts of the USA by Juliet Gordon Low in 1912. This month, I want to share with you the philatelic recognition that the United States has given to these important organizations.

It was not until 1950 that the first U.S. Boy Scout stamps appeared, commemorating the 2<sup>nd</sup> National Jamboree. I really like this design, because it shows a Cub Scout, a Boy Scout, and at the top what I believe to be an Eagle



Scout. I was a successful Cub Scout, but couldn't pass the knot tying part of the Tenderfoot requirement, so never made it to the point where I could earn a stamp collecting merit badge. Ten years later, in 1960, the U.S. issued the stamp shown at right to recognize the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Boy Scouts. With the



approaching centennial celebration, sheets of both of these stamps are now selling at a high premium.

The first stamp to recognize Girl Scouts appeared in 1948 to honor their founder, Juliette Gordon Low, eighty-



eight years after her birth and twenty-one years after her death. Since then, the Girl Scouts have been recognized in 1962 with a stamp commemorating the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of their founding.

It was five years later before another scouting postal issue appeared. That time it was a 6 cent domestic air mail postcard,

SINL SCOURS-U.S.A.

issued in 1967 for the World Jamboree. I bought the beautiful first day canceled example below at Knoxpex 2009 for only \$1, and it shows a beautifully engraved Art Craft cachet. Properly postally used copies from the period of issue are worth much more.



Next, in 1985 came a Boy Scout stamp, which was part of the International Youth Year series.



This was followed in 1987 by a beautiful stamp (below left) showing achievement badges in honor of the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Girl Scouts. – but I don't see the collecting badge.



## Treasurer's Report - Knoxpex 2009

At the April monthly meeting I reported that Knoxpex 2009 was a financial success for our club. We still have some bills and some income to report so the final figures are not yet available. The approximate net income for the club will be \$1,050.

This will be the third highest net income in the last 10 years, even though we had a new venue and higher expenses than in previous years. KPS has made a profit, sometimes very little, in nine of the last ten years. Only in 2002 was there a loss.

Miscellaneous expenses (guard, advertisement, auction, stamps for mailing) for the show were about the same as last year. Our income from the auction was down because last year we had over 40 lots that were donated for club support. Dealer fees, along with income from the sale of the Lincoln cachets helped to make up the some of difference.

We did have some learning experiences with our new venue, but management and the hotel staff were most cooperative in all areas. One expense that we had this year that we will not have next year is rental of extra. We were not sure that some of the hotel's tables put together would be sturdy enough for dealers stock. They were, and next year we will not have to rent tables. The club has signed a new contract for Knoxpex 2010 with the Holiday Inn for March 5-7, 2010 (Setup Mar 5<sup>th</sup>), with the same price for rental as this year.

This year, we were fortunate that the Lincoln bicentennial stamps were issued just a few weeks before Knoxpex 2009. Our expectations were that the USPS would have a nice stamp commemorating the centennial of the Boy Scouts of America early next year, too. That appears not to be in the plans.

A few weeks ago, I sent e-mails to Congressman John Duncan and to the web site of Scouts on Stamps Society International (SOSSI). I received immediate e-mail responses from both, and Congressman Duncan's office followed up with a letter and printed information. Lawrence Clay, secretary of SOSSI wrote that "The USPS has no plans to do so and the official position of the Citizens Stamp Advisory Committee is that the Boy Scouts do not qualify for a stamp under their established criteria. The only possibility of a stamp issue is to get enough congressional support to influence the Postmaster General to get him to override the Citizens Stamp Advisory Committee." Information from Congressman Duncan's office indicated the same decision.

We plan to use the 1950 scout stamp (below) together with a 41 cent flag coil stamp on our cachets next



spring, but any KPS member should fee free to contact the Postmaster General, Mr. John E. Potter, 475 L'Enfant Plaza SW, Washington DC 20260-0010, to

request a new scout stamp for 2010.

### **President's Column**

As my first act as the new KPS President I want to thank Roy Row for an outstanding year as our President. Row has the spirit that makes this club great, and he took on the job in order to make the club more enjoyable for everyone. Thanks Roy.

The financial condition of our club is great and has even improved over the last few years. We need to have money in savings to support the programs of the club. However, our bank account has grown well beyond what we need. As I reminded everybody at the last meeting, we are a philatelic club, not an investment club. So I hope we can use some of this money to help improve the KPS experience for all members.

There are 2 main reasons for attending KPS meetings: (1) Philately and (2) Fellowship. Once a month KPS members meet to enjoy each other's company, learn about what we collect, and what our goals are for collecting. ### The UPU's Green, Red, and Blue

Have you ever wondered why United States commemorative stamps in the first third of the twentieth century, plus our definitive stamps for more than 50 years had the same color and value combinations? One cent stamps were green, two cent stamps were red, and five cent stamps were blue. The coordination of colors and values, however, was not limited to the U.S., but characterized stamps of equivalent value for all countries who were members of the Universal Postal Union, or UPU.



The web site <a href="http://alphabetilately.com/U.html">http://alphabetilately.com/U.html</a> has some great information about the UPU, which was founded in 1874. Prior to that time, postal rates between countries were governed by individual postal treaties, and the lack of uniform international rates created many problems for postal clerks and for mail transit. That web site states that "At each transfer point along its way every piece of mail had to be examined, and the debits and credits for its journey to that point figured and recorded. Then periodically all of that had to be totaled and the resulting monies due or owed transferred between postal authorities. The UPU put an end to all of that, by establishing standard rates for all international mail, regardless of the route it took."

Uniform rates meant faster and more efficient handling. Then, in 1896, UPU members adopted a standard color scheme that further facilitated handling of international mails. Although some web sites, including <a href="http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Postage\_stamp\_color">http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Postage\_stamp\_color</a> and <a href="http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Postage\_stamp\_color">http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Postage\_stamp\_color</a> incorrectly claim that some of these colors were specified by the UPU for domestic rates, the UPU had no influence on the domestic postal rates of countries, and these colors all were originally specific only to international rates. The green stamp paid the rate for 50 grams of printed material sent in an unsealed envelope or wrapper band. The red stamp paid the international rate for a postcard, and the blue stamp paid the rate for a 20 gram letter in a sealed envelope. With that change, postal clerks could more easily check proper postage at a glance. However, it was still possible to use combinations of lower denomination stamps in different colors, and printed material or letters that appeared to be heavier required closer examination.

Standard stamp colors passed from the world scene in the 1950's as more countries issued colorful commemorative stamps that were used increasingly on international mail. The alphabetilately web site (above) states that "Recently the UPU has been active in trying to stop the torrent of bogus stamps flooding the philatelic world. They have joined the World Association for the Development of Philately (WADP) to create a system (called the WADP Numbering System, or WNS), in which world postal authorities submit all their new issues to be recorded in a database which is then available to anyone interested, to verify whether a stamp is valid or not." You can see photos of recent stamps from many countries in the WADP at <a href="https://www.wnsstamps.ch/en/participating.html">www.wnsstamps.ch/en/participating.html</a>."

The UPU is headquartered in Berne, Switzerland, where a monument was erected in 1909 in honor of the organization. The UPU web site – <u>www.upu.int</u> – describes the monument as the work of French sculptor René de Saint-Marceaux depicting five messengers symbolizing the five continents as they pass letters around the globe.



The monument is shown on the 10 centime Swiss stamp pictured above and on this month's "stamp of the month," both of which were issued in 1949 to commemorate the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the UPU.



## A "Relative" Source of Stamps

As a collector for over 50 years I have amassed quite a combination of stamps, albums and literature. Although I never met a stamp I didn't like, my major interest lie in US postage, Canadian and pre-1940 classics from Europe, Latin American, and the British Commonwealth. And one of my prize collections is stamps of Great Britain.

My British collection includes many classics including the Penny Black and Scott #2 from 1840. In addition I have many definitive issues of the reigns of Queen Victoria, King Edward VII, King George V, King Edward VIII, King George VI and Queen Elizabeth II. But another prized collection is the commemoratives. These go back several decades, but I'm fortunate to have almost a complete collection of mint commemoratives from 1975 through 2005. I must say these are some of the most beautiful, historical and relevant issues in the world.

How was I able to gather such a collection? The source has been my mother-in-law, Lynn Hilliard (with me below right). Mum is a resident of Northampton in the English Midlands and is a decorated veteran of World War II. She learned of my collecting interest in

the mid-seventies and has been my source ever since. I was never in doubt what my birthday and Christmas would bring when the parcel arrived from


overseas.

The British issue most commemoratives as a set of four or five differing values reflecting the same theme. For collectors they provide "Presentation Packs" of the new stamps (example below). Each pack, including the example below, contains the stamps and a full color folder enclosed in plastic describing the background and significance of the stamps and related philatelic information, such as designer, type of production and date of issue. I mount the stamps in my Gibbon Windsor II album and save the folders in dedicated boxes. I have lost count of the number of such packs but it runs in the hundreds.

For years Mum would watch the newspaper for new issues and walk to the village post office and buy each set. The postmaster knew to set aside one pack of new issues for Mrs. Hilliard. Over the past few years her health does not allow her to get out as much. But when she is out, she asks to go by the post office and see what's new. And every couple of months I receive a letter in which she has enclosed the stamps she has received on her mail torn out of the



covers. Mum also visits the local stamp shop and gets my album supplements plus the annual edition of Gibbon's "Collect British Stamps." (continued on p. 4)

I also prize my collection for its beauty, completeness and value, but the major source of joy is knowing that it came together as an act of love. I dedicate this article to Mum as she nears her 87<sup>th</sup> birthday.


be spending a week in Guadalajara, Mexico, working on a Rotary humanitarian grant project.




#### Get Well Phil

#### President's Column

As you may know we are planning to have our annual Holiday party and last KPS meeting of the year at "Mama Blues," 9645 Kingston Pike. This meeting will be held on our regular first Tuesday date, December 1. What you may not have heard is that "Mama Blues" has changed its name to "Five Dollar Buffet." ### Meet Me in St. Louis for the Auction!

Thomas Lane and I drove to St Louis June 5 on a mission. We wanted to purchase on behalf of the club one or more collections/accumulations to bring stamps back to our stamp club meetings! The challenge was to keep the stamps and the trip cost within our budget. There was no time to take pictures at the auction, but the photos here are from the first viewing and purchasing at the June 30 KPS 5<sup>th</sup> Tuesday meeting.

We left after work on Friday, stayed overnight in Hopkinsville, KY, and were up and away very early to be at Regency's doors by 9 AM (we made it at 9:10). This was my 7<sup>th</sup> visit to their shop, a very pleasant and surprisingly small business building about 1.5 miles from downtown St Louis. It was like going back to "Cheers" the bar, where everybody knows my name. I was expecting a fairly good crowd of auction lot examiners on Saturday; in the past when Bill Muenzer and I went to look for lots, we usually had a dozen or more competitors looking on Saturday. But for most of the day, Thomas and I had the lot examination area to ourselves. Out front, the Auction began about 10 AM, but our lots would not come to the hammer until



Sunday about noon.



For several weeks before the auction, I had followed the opening bids for about 80 lots on-line, and felt prepared for the bidding. We had to eliminate all of those already opening at over \$1000 as too expensive for our budget. I took on the US lots, and Thomas looked at collections and lots from individual foreign countries. Then we split up the World Wide lots, he taking the even numbers and I taking the odd numbers. Even with both of us working hard (no lunch or breaks of any kind) we still barely made it through all the lots. Many were rejected as already opening for more than I felt they were worth. By the end of the day we had about 20 lots that we were willing to pay more than the opening bid. We closed the place about 7 PM, checked into our hotel, and caught dinner at a pleasant Italian restaurant.

We were back at Regency by 9 AM Sunday. Opening bids had gone up over night, eliminating 3 of our possible lots. I was amazed at the small crowd; 20 or less. but two of them were auction agents. A very nice US collection opened at \$425. I was prepared to go to \$650 for it. One of the

agents bid along with me, and when it reached \$800 I dropped out. Other US collections went for more than I felt they were worth. We were also unable to buy any of the individual country collections Thomas had selected. The lot which would have been best for the

collections Thomas had selected. The lot which would have been best for the club was a two-volume set of 19<sup>th</sup> century worldwide stamps. Opening at \$600, I was prepared to go to \$900 for it, but had to drop out at \$1025. Now the auction was down to 25 lots and we had bought nothing. I still had 5 lots on my list that I had intended to use as "filler," lots to buy if we still had money after buying one a "good" lot. So I bought all of them, paying more in some cases than I had wanted, but feeling we had to come home with something.



The results were mixed. One very good lot had US, foreign, and covers, and the price I paid was good. We also got 5 big boxes of modern FDC albums and highly commercial pages of mint stamps. This lot I felt was a mistake to have purchased. We did get a lot of high value Japan, Great Britain and Germany, and a specialized lot of Canadian tagging and plate varieties. We drove straight back to Knoxville, getting home about 11:30 PM. If we do this again, I will purchase a good US or foreign collection lot and try to remember that I don't have to bid as low as I did when I was a stamp dealer. This is more for fun than profit!!!



### President's Column

Here are the results of our survey on what members like about our club and how we could improve it. I received replies from 31 of our 70 members - a very good response rate. Of the responses, 7 came from people who can only attend meetings less than 5 times a year. The reason cited most often for not being able to attend meetings was distance. When asked about attending a Saturday meeting, 21 members said they would be interested. A dozen of these preferred a Saturday afternoon meeting, while 16 members said they could attend anytime.

When asked how the regular meetings could be improved, the largest response was to keep the business part short (16 members), followed by adding a silent auction (8 members), more audio/video presentations (5 members), and 4 members suggested adding games, puzzles and contests. We had one excellent "OTHER" suggestion to have a "clothesline exhibit" once a year, with one to three page exhibits. This sounds like a good way to learn about exhibiting and to share your area of interest with other members.

When asked if they will attend Knoxpex 2010, 27 members answered "yes" and 2 members answered "maybe." Our one "no" response was from our member moving out of the country, so he is excused. Three members expressed an interest in exhibiting at Knoxpex this year and 8 members were considering it. Sixteen members found the APS Sales Books a useful way to add to their collections. It looks like we can expect 28 to 34 people to show up for this year"s Christmas party, so it should be a blast. Finally, when asked to rank this newsletter 27 rated it "Excellent" and 2 as "very good." I want to thank all of the members who participated in this survey.

### **Chasing Those Tiny Envelopes**

The term "vest pocket" used to be common in our hobby, and it referred usually to a dealer who kept the sales stock in just a few stock cards that could fit conveniently into the pocket of a coat or vest. Our hobby is a very portable one, and I bet that at the same time there were "vest pocket collectors," who were so specialized that they could carry the most important parts of their collections similarly. Several years ago, I began collecting visiting card (or carte-de-visite) envelopes from France – maybe I am now a vest-pocket postal history collector.

These tiny envelopes typically contained a visiting card, with the sender's name engraved on it. From the 1850's until the 1970's, the French post office had special discounted rates for these, and it has been fun trying to find examples of each of more than 100 different rates. I wrote an article that appeared in last September's *American Philatelist*. I was completely amazed when my article was the cover story and even more so when it was chosen the best article in *American Philatelist* for 2008. My trip to Stamp Show in Pittsburgh was all the more rewarding, and I got to meet Barbara Mueller, a legendary philatelic author and editor, for whom my award is named.

Here, I want to share with you some of my recent "finds." The earliest example shown here was mailed from

France in 1924, addressed to General Johnson Hagood in Washington, DC, then forwarded to Manila in the Philippine Islands. I have e-mailed a specialist on U.S. military in the Philippines to find out what the camp indicated in pencil was.

Another recently acquired visiting card envelope is the one shown below, addressed at the end of World War II to the Central Agency for Prisoners of War of the International Red Cross in Geneva, Switzerland.

At the left edge, the envelope was slit open, the contents examined, and resealed with paper tape. The oval hand stamp says that it was opened by military authority. The envelope was mailed a little more than a month after VE Day on May 8, 1945 and has postage to cover the sealed letter rate.

Some of my greatest collecting challenges are in the period after World War II, when rates changed frequently. My third "treasure" is the envelope at right, which shows the 6 franc foreign rate for an unsealed envelope containing only a printed card, with no handwritten message.

Keep an eye out for these little gems. For now, I need to get a vest with bigger pockets.

# You Never Know What You Will Find at the Local Stamp Show

I went to Bill Muenzer's stamp show on August 15, little knowing that I would find a new facet of one of my collecting areas – revenue stamps with complete dates from October 1862 to December 31, 1967. I went to Bill's show expecting to find a few new dates in dealers" stocks, and I managed to find about 40 that I didn't already have. But at Tony Rosen's table (Stamps Unlimited of Georgia) I discovered a type of dated revenue I had never seen. It was one of the Match & Medicine series of privately printed stamps used on products. These were first produced during the Civil War and later during the Spanish American War. I usually don't bother to look in this section because M&M stamps were not required to have dates applied to them, as were Federal revenue stamps.

Tony had a US 1894 Bureau issue overprinted medicine stamp, RS312, overprinted with "Dr. K & Co./I.R./Binghamton, N.Y./7-11-98." Then I



discovered in the Scott U.S. Specialized catalog this group of stamps that qualified for my collection. When taxes were enacted and the battleship tax stamps for the Spanish American War were issued, the law required that the stamps

be used on all products covered beginning July 1, 1898. However, Dr. Kilmer & Co. in Binghamton, NY, had not received the new stamps and had a lot of products to ship. Faced with losses if their goods were not shipped and penalties if they were shipped without revenue stamps, Kilmer created private overprints that were applied to existing postage stamps. The overprints are known on the 1¢ green Franklin (Scott 279), 2¢ carmine (Scott 267a) and 2¢ red (Scott 279Be) Washington, and the 3¢ Jackson (Scott 268). These stamps are known only with the dates of July 5, 6, 7, 9, 11, 12, 13, and 14, after which the Battle Ship revenues apparently arrived.

I am really excited to add a new (but expensive) element to my hunt for dated revenues. I am now on the chase. You never know what new things will turn up in this old hobby!





#### **Smoky Mountain Stamp Connections**

On the weekend of June 13-15, 2009, the Great Smoky Mountains National Park celebrated its 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary. Details of the history of the park may be found in the timeline at http://greatsmokies75th.org. It recounts early plans, the acquisition of land, the June 15, 1934 act of Congress establishing the park, and many other important historical milestones. As one of the newest national parks at the time, the Smokies were especially fortunate to be chosen for the high value in the 1934 national parks issue, with the 10 cent stamp issued on October 8. The



first day cover shown at left is postmarked in Sevier-ville, with a boxed slogan "Gatlinburg Rural Station.

This would not be the last appearance of this spectacularly beautiful stamp. The following year, imperforate sheets of the entire national parks stamps

were issued to satisfy collector demand and dampen criticism of Postmaster General Farley's previous special issues that had not been widely available.

Then, on August 26, 1937, the design appeared again in a souvenir sheet issued for the annual meeting of the Society of Philatelic Americans. The sheet was first issued at the SPA convention, and the cachet below has the

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SPA logo, in addition to the Asheville, NC date stamp with S.P.A. Convention cancellation. Just three years later, the park was officially dedicated by President Franklin Roosevelt.



A full sixty-nine years passed before another Smoky Mountain stamp appeared. This one is part of the scenic

American landscapes air mail series begun in 1999. The 2006 stamp looks entirely like an artist's impression, but in fact is based on a photograph taken from Clingmans Dome by California photographer, David Muench (www.usps.com). The park continues to be one of the most popular in the nation and is famous for its free admission. If you get excited about anniversaries and celebrations of great events by postage stamps, like I do, you may be surprised to know that there were no plans to wait until the park's 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary this year. So, there is the story of Smoky Mountain stamps. Or is it? Turn to the next page for the latest chapter!"

A recent article in *Linn's Stamp News* reported that it will cost \$134.71 to purchase a mint copy of each new issue, the largest total in the 19 years that *Linn's* has kept track this statistic. Most of the increase is for postal stationery – envelopes and postal cards – which will cost collectors \$61.86.

#### **Economical Starter Albums**

By Charlie Wade

As with all stamp collectors I have a budget for my collecting interest. I spend most of my budget on US stamps; however, I've about reached the limits of purchasing power for my "US Want List." I am now looking at other countries or topics to enhance my collection. One can find a number of starter packets for countries at reasonable prices. But buying albums for starter collections can be expensive.

There is a very economical way to get albums for starter collections: the *Scott e-Worldwide Album*. This album is available on CD ROM or online. It covers 375 countries from Abu Dhabi to Zimbabwe with 728 pages containing over 10,000 black and white stamp images. The illustrations contain the "face different" stamps that most beginning or intermediate collectors would find, and each illustration is marked with the Scott catalogue number.



The album has a summary description of pertinent geographical, political and economic information of most countries:

- Location
- Type of Government
- Area
- Population
- Capital
- Language
- Currency

One more advantage of this album is that selected country pages can be printed. You could develop a specialty album for British colonies, Eastern Europe, or the Caribbean. One could even cut and paste illustrations to layout your own topical pages. To print the album, you can order Scott chemically inert

archival printer paper and a Scott e-series binder is available. But in keeping with a low cost objective, high quality chemically inert paper can be found at office supply stores at lower prices. A high quality 3-ring binder can be used with the printable full-color album cover inserted on the front

An e-album starter set including the CD-ROM, printer paper and album binder is available from Amos Advantage for about \$30.00. But online access to the album software is included with a subscription to the e-version of *Linn's Stamp News*. An annual subscription for this on-line service cost \$10.00, but *Linn's* often offers a free trial subscription. All told, Scott's *e-World Album* is ideally suited for beginner or intermediate collectors and offers an economical way to expand your collection.

#### **New Museum Exhibit**

KPS member Gerald Schroedl (below) is curator for the recently opened exhibit, "Discovering American Indian Art," at the Frank H. McClung Museum on the University of Tennessee campus. The exhibit explores nearly two centuries of art forms and cultural traditions from coast to coast and north to south.



In addition to his philatelic activities, Gerald is an archeologist and professor of anthropology at UT. The museum is open free to the public and this exhibit is on display until January 10, 2010 – don't miss it. http://mcclungmuseum.utk.edu

### **Stamp of the Month**

This month's stamp is a "what's-it" from Colombia. It looks like a stamp, but lacks the word "correos" – Spanish for "post." The inscription "Ley 128 de 1941 – Fondo de Catastro" refers to a legislative decree of December 13, which specified export controls on



coffee and strategic materials, including platinum following the outbreak of World War II. We'll try to find out if it was a war tax or revenue stamp – stay

tuned. These historical items are part of the Regency Auction lots purchased for KPS.

### It's Time to Exhibit - What Do Judges Want in an Exhibit?

Who are philatelic judges? To be an American Philatelic Society accredited judge, a person must first win at least a National Vermeil Medal with an exhibit, but most judges have won gold medals and even Grand Awards. They have the experience as exhibitors to know exactly what an exhibitor has to go through to acquire material, put together an exhibit, spend hours worrying over the tiny details, editing and redoing pages.

Being a judge will not make you wealthy! Judges tend to absorb many of the costs of attending a show from their own pockets. They are paid an honorarium, which may cover their air fare or their hotel, but not all costs. And the money they spend on their judging is money they cannot spend on their collections and exhibits, but judges frequently are seen buying from dealers – after the judging is finished.

Finally, judges are overworked. At last count there were only about 125 nationally accredited APS judges!

When an exhibitor prepares an exhibit for competition, it must be prepared to be viewed and evaluated by people who are experienced exhibitors, knowledgeable philatelists, who are donating their own time and some of their own money, and who may be somewhat overworked.

Here are some important points that judges will expect and will be disappointed not to find:

- 1) **Perfect grammar**. No misspellings, no white out, no "grammar gremlins." Anything less may cost you points in the judging.
- 2) **Truth**. Judges may know more than you do about the subject you are showing. Even if they don't, they know a great deal more than you might think, because they borrow references to learn more about your topic. Never put anything on the page as a fact unless you are sure it is true. You can speculate, and probably should to make your point, but you must let the viewer know that is what you are doing.
- 3) Material in the best condition you can afford. Of course there are unique items that exist only in damaged condition (such as the famous British Guiana 1 cent which is trimmed at the corners), but if you are showing anything remotely affordable, get the very best. This is critical for any common stamp.
- 4) A title page that explains the purpose of the exhibit, defines a scope, and indicates the layout of the exhibit. I have covered the title page in a previous seminar. Be sure that the title page indicates how to find the "gems" of your exhibit.
- 5) **Philatelic Knowledge**. Even if you are showing a <u>topic</u> and devote space for the stamps to illustrate the topic, you must know about and explain the stamps or covers you are showing. A beautiful exhibit explaining the life and range of honey bees would do poorly if the stamps were never mentioned in the text. And see 2 above for anything you say about the material.
- 6) **Completeness**. To win at the National level you should have all or nearly all the material that exists in your area. Cost may be your only constraint. If you leave out an item that is relatively common, the Judges will find fault with that part of your exhibit.
- 7) **Consistency of Style**. The paper you mount on, the font styles on the pages, the mounting material, the way you emphasize your best material, all must be absolutely uniform throughout the exhibit. Trust me, if you use paper from several different lots, when you stand back from your frames, the shades of white of different papers will stand out like beacons.

- 8) **Flow**. Pages and their contents should follow each other in a logical way that is easy to follow. If there are transitions in the exhibit, they need to be highlighted so that judges do not find themselves reading a page and wondering what just happened in the story.
- 9) **A beginning and an end**. Explain why the exhibit starts where it does and why it ends where it does. You may think this is self-evident, but it still needs to be explained.
