

At the December meeting, the club voted to accept the nominations proposed by the chairman of the nominating committee, Ron Mynatt. These nominations are subject to the by-laws changes to be voted on in January, as there are some new offices and some revisions in terms, etc. The nominees are: President - Richard Tipton; Vice-President - Bob Toal; Secretary - Bill Boegly; Treasurer - Lo Boegly; 4-year Board Member - Dean Treadway; 3-year Board Member - Harold Carmichael; and 1-year Board Member - Jamie Large. The other two board positions will not be on the ballot, as they do not need to be voted upon. They are: Ex-officio Board Member (Editor of the newsletter) - Jo Mynatt; and 2-year Board Member (whose term is still in effect) - Jocelyn King.

BY-LAWS CHANGES

As discussed at the December meeting, the following by-laws changes will be voted upon at the January 7 meeting:

Article III. Paragraph C will be amended to read:

- C. The Knoxville Stamp Club will be a not-for-profit working organization. Article IV, Paragraph D will be amended to read:
- D. The Board of Directors shall be composed of the above officers, plus four directors to be elected by the membership. Initially, one director will be elected for a four year term, one director for a three year term, one director for a two year term, and one director for a one year term. In subsequent elections, one director will be elected for a four year term.
- Article IV. Paragraph E will be added:
- E. The editor of the Knoxville Stamp Club Newsletter shall be appointed by the president and verified by the membership. The editor shall have a position ex-officio on the Board of Directors.
- Article VI, Paragraph F will be amended to read:
- F. All expenses over \$50.00 must be approved by a majority of the members present at a regular club meeting. All checks should be co-signed by the president and the treasurer. In the absence of the president, checks may be co-signed by any other authorized officer.

Article VII, Paragraph C will be amended to read:

C. Dues will be pro-rated at the regular July meeting.

KNOXPEX '86 NEWS

Plans are well underway for the most successful show this club has ever held. Since the show is March 1 and 2, there are only two meetings before the big event. Time is very short, so we will be asking you to sign up to man the hospitality table Saturday or Sunday, and also to bring some refreshments for the snack buffet on Sunday evening. For the buffet, the club will be providing sandwiches and drinks, and we will be counting on you to bring veggies (Carrot and celery sticks, pickles, raw broccoli, etc.), potato chips, crackers, dips and spreads, and sweets (Brownies, cookies, candies, etc.). Please plan to serve at the club's hospitality table for an hour, and decide what you can bring for the buffet. You will be given an opportunity to sign up for both of these privileges at the January 7 meeting.

Here are some of the exciting features of Knoxpex '86: On March 1, at 10 a.m., the show will be opened with a ribbon-cutting ceremony with celebrity guests. The bourse is planned to contain 14 dealers, from several states, and the post office will also have a booth. There will be a special cacheted envelope available with the theme of Tennessee Homecoming '86, and a special cancel for your souvenir covers. Adjacent to the club's hospitality table, there will be a special place for the young people - some of the features of this area will be free literature and stamps, a stamp-designing contest. tips and pointers on stamp collecting tecniques, and free gifts. At the end of the show, there will be an awards ceremony and snack buffet for all.



The Stamp of the Month this month is one of Switzerland's interesting definitives. We have used stamps from two different series, so you will have to figure out what stamp you have. One series was issued in 1977, and the stamps show either a horse race in Zürich (10¢) or New Year's Eve costumes in Herisau. These are some of the native folk customs of the country. The other series was issued in 1982, and shows a variety of town scenes accompanied with one of the signs of the zodiac. You may have a view of the town of Old Bern and Aquarius (1.00), a scene showing Graustock and Aries (120), or the Babel Cathedral and Taurus (1.50) We hope you enjoy these stamps, donated by Ernest Zurcher.

MINUTES FROM THE JANUARY 7 MEETING

The club met with 48 members and visitors present. The minutes from the December meeting were approved as published in the newsletter. The treasurer's report showed a balance of \$517.07 and \$62.99 in petty cash. The first business handled was the election of officers for 1986. Elected for 1986 were: Richard Tipton - President; Bob Toal - Vice-president; Bill Boegly - Secretary; Lo Boegly - Treasurer; Harold "Mike" Carmichael - 3 year Board Member; Dean Treadway - 4 year Board Member; and Jamie Large - 1 year Board Member. The meeting was then turned over to the newly elected officers. In the absence of Richard Tipton, Bob Toal finished officiating the meeting. The second order of business was to vote on the by-laws changes announced at the December meeting and in the newsletter. All five changes were passed. Dean Treadway asked if a copy of the by-laws could be made available for the membership. It was agreed that copies would be available at the February meeting. Bruce Roberts, Bourse Chairman, reported that we have 7 dealers' deposits and 4 more committed to the show. Dean Treadway, Exhibit Chairman, set a deadline for having your exhibits entered into the show, THE DAY BEFORE THE SHOW, FEBRUARY 28, 1986. Jo Mynatt, Co-Chairperson of Publicity, informed us that we have a TV show, "Good Morning, Tennessee", February 27, 1986 at 6 a.m. She also said that there will be fliers at the next meeting to be distributed by the members at businesses near them. There will be written critiques by judges for all exhibits entered. Jo is also involved in the auctions to be held at the show. Harry Sanders made an announcement that he is going out of business. Phil Lewis announced the program for the Oak Ridge Stamp Club. The Beginner's Club met with Les Lebo. He gave a talk on postal cards and post cards, which will continue at the February meeting. The door prize was won by Barbara DeArmond, Jo Mynatt's mother. Refreshments were furnished by a number of club members. Thanks to all of you who brought something.

Our former president, Dean Treadway, has volunteered to start a library for the club. He will be willing to catalogue and house the books, check them out to members, keep track of them, and keep us informed as to what is available in the way of philatelic literature. The club can add to this library as a special project, and it will benefit all of us. If you have any books you would like to donate to this undertaking, please bring them to the club meeting and give them to Dean.

ATOMIC CITY STAMP CLUB PROGRAMS


The club meets at the Civic Center in Oak Ridge on the third Thursday of each month.

The February 4 program will be a talk by Richard Tipton on "Lock Seal Stamps". On March 4, we hope to have the judges from the show to speak to us about the way exhibits are judged and how to organize an exhibit. For those of you who would like to exhibit, but have never tried, this would be a good time to find out just what goes into making up an exhibit and how to have an award-winning one. At the April 1 meeting, Dean Treadway will be explaining about setting up the club library, what is already available, and how to check books out Later, we will have some slide shows, and in July, there will be another bingo party. The slide shows will be announced as soon as we have a list. Plans are underway for a tour of the new Post Office Facility when it is completed. 1986 is on its way to becoming the best year ever for our club.

SHOW NEWS

The board held a long and interesting meeting Jan. 21, and numerous items pertaining to the show were discussed. Here are listed highlights of the plans for the show.

- 1. CACHET We will have a four-color cachet depicting the Tennessee Homecoming '86 logo. The envelopes will be printed at a cost of \$109.32 for 1000. The cancel also shows the same logo, with killer bars. (Pictured below)
- 2. RUBBER STAMP The board decided to have the design that we had planned to use for the cancel made into a rubber handstamp. This will be used as a backstamp on the envelopes, and can be used after the show for other purposes. (Pictured below)
- 3. STAMP DESIGNING CONTEST The stamp designing contest will be for kids from 0 to 14. There will be three **catego**ries: Ages under 6; 6 10; and 11 14. The drawings will be judged by 2 judges, one from the field of art and the other a philatelist. There will be one grand award in each category. All the pictures will be on display for everybody to see. The winning drawings will be sent to the Citizen's Advisory Committee on Stamp Design. Paper, markers, pens and pencils, crayons, rulers, stencils, and all sorts of art supplies will be provided for the children.
- 4. LIVE AUCTION Richard Tipton is to be the auctioneer. The dealers will not be allowed to place a minimum bid under \$10, therefore low-value lots will have no minimums. The auction will begin at 6 p.m. Saturday.
- 5. SILENT AUCTION You will find a form for submitting lots in the silent auction in this newsletter. All the rules will be the same as at our monthly silent auctions, EXCEPT if you do put a minimum on a lot and it does not sell, the club will take a 25¢ fee.
- 6. EXHIBITS You will also find in this newsletter an exhibit form. Please fill these out and give to Dean Treadway at the meeting. We would like to have more of you exhibiting, even one or two pages. If you have anything on Tennessee postal history (Old or modern), it would be very appropriate. Wilma Brookshier and Jo Mynatt are working on a four frame exhibit for the club, which will show a lot of interesting Tennessee history in pictures and postcards in the early 1900's.
- 7. TV SHOW (s) FEBRUARY 27, CHANNEL 6, at 6 a.m. Richard Tipton and Bob Toal will be seen on "Good Morning, Tennessee". There is a possibility of another show on Channel 10, but a date is not known at this time.
- 8. SNACK BUFFET The buffet and awards ceremony will be held at 5 p.m. Sunday evening. Another category has been added to the items to bring. It is FRUITS. You will have an opportunity to sign up for this at the meeting. Please help out.
- 9. HOSPITALITY TABLE We also need people to man the club's table. Many have already signed up, but more are needed.
- 10. SET UP FRAMES We need people to come down Friday night and arrange the room and set up frames. If you would be willing to do this, see Les Lebo or Ray Ritter. You will be notified of time, etc. later.

The design on this stamp symbolizes the cooperation among the six countries comprising the Coal and Steel Community of Europe. Belgium, France, Germany, Italy, Luxembourg, and the Netherlands all issued stamps with this design. Your stamp is from the Netherlands, and is number 368 in the Scott Catalogue. TENNESSEE HOMECOMING SPECIAL

A Report By Dean Treadway

The club was contacted by Mr. Bill Roop, the director of sales and customer relations at the Knoxville Post Office. He had some late-breaking news which he felt would be of interest to our club concerning a train called the Tennessee Homecoming Special. The train will be making its way across the state beginning May 19, originating in Bristol. Aboard the train will be Governor Alexander and his entourage. The train will be at Bristol all day Sunday, May 18 and depart at 7:00 a.m. on the 19th. The Special will travel across the state making scheduled stops along the way.

A postal booth will be set up at each station on the route, and there will be a mail car travelling with the train where postal clerks will be selling supplies and applying special cancels commemorating the event. However, please note, both the cancel on board the train and the one at the station will be identical in appearance. Each will say "TENNESSEE HOMECOMING SPECIAL / RAILROAD STATION / CITY, TN ZIP" on three lines. There will NOT be an RPO cancel.

Also available at the postal booths on the train and at the stations will be specially prepared cacheted envelopes with accompanying folders and a special poster commemorating the event. The post office will sell the unstamped cacheted envelope with folder for \$1.25 and the poster for \$1.50. They will have 20,000 of each on hand.

Of additional interest is the fact that the post office will be getting these items from Nashville to sell on consignment. The covers and posters will be on sale at the post offices for the rest of 1986. However, if the post office has not sold at least 40% of their consignment by October 14, the supplier will be free to seek other outlets of distribution.

Mr. Roop did not know what the design of the cachet or the poster would be, but my guess is that it would be of a general nature with Tennessee Homecoming '86 as the theme.

Of course there will be other activities along the route. However, Mr. Roop could only relate to me what the post office is directly involved in. He is responsible for the operation of all the philatelic booths between Bristol and Sweetwater.

The following is an itinerary for the East Tennessee leg of the Homecoming Special: Sunday, May 18 - hold up in Bristol;

Monday, May 19 - leave Bristol 7:00 a.m.;

arrive Johnson City 8:00 a.m., depart 9:30 a.m.;

arrive Greenville 10:45 a.m., depart 12:15 p.m.;

arrive Morristown 1:15 p.m., depart 2:45 p.m.;

arrive Knoxville 4:15 p.m. for layover. Mail car and booths will remain open until 6:00 p.m.;

Tuesday, May 20 - leave Knoxville 8:00 a.m.;

arrive Sweetwater 11:00 a.m., depart 12:30 p.m.;

next stop Cleveland and points west.


If you would like to obtain covers with cancels from each of the stations, you may mail stamped, self-addressed envelopes under cover to the postmaster of each city where the train will stop. Enclose your instructions for servicing and note on the outer cover "REQUEST FOR TENNESSEE HOMECOMING SPECIAL TRAIN CANCEL". Mr. Roop can supply you with a schedule of all of the stops on the route. His phone number at the post office is 521-8360. He said he would be glad to help.

There are a lot of details that, as of this writing, have not been finalized. I called Southern Railway and the governor's office and really didn't get much more than what Bill Roop had. However, I did learn that there will be an article in Thursday, May 1 newspaper, which will hopefully cover everything I haven't. Look for this article, and we will be discussing further details at the meeting.

THREE-MONTH RAFFLE

The club's three-month raffle continues this month. Sales of the tickets are going well, but we need to sell a lot more. You only have this meeting and the June meeting to get yours. The item being raffled off is a mint U.S. C-18, never-hinged, average to fine centering, very nice color. It would make a fine addition to your collection. The stamp will be on view at the meeting. WAITING AT THE STATION







POST OFFICE FACTS

ARTICLE BY DEAN TREADWAY

A gentleman with whom I work ran into a situation at the post office the other day that I thought might be of interest to you. He mailed a letter at the window and had a 10¢ surcharge tacked onto the 22¢ he had already paid. I found out that a regulation allowing the post office to impose such a surcharge on letters was adopted in 1978. You may or may not be aware of it. The regulation reads: Whenever a letter's size exceeds 6 1/8" in width or 11 1/2" in length, an additional ten cent charge may be levied. However, this only applies if the letter's weight is under one ounce. If it is over an ounce, then the amount of postage goes strictly by weight. Interesting, isn't it?

STAMP OF THE MONTH




PAPERCLIP ODDITY

This 2¢ stamp was paperclipped to the post card and then cancelled!

Close inspection of the card reveals a machine cancellation on the post card underneath the stamp. The card was originally mailed without a stamp and held by the post office (note held for postage marking). Upon receiving a 2¢ stamp without gum, a postal clerk paperclipped the stamp to the piece and hand-cancelled the stamp (note marking: this is the mail for which you sent postage).

The 2¢ stamp pays the 1¢ post card rate plus a 1¢ penalty fee for an item mailed without attached postage.



Besides John, there were Bruce Roberts, Mike Carmichael, Bob Toal and myself. John provided the camper and the towing vehicle which made it possible for us to attend. Motel and hotel expenses immediate to the Convention Center were astronomical, and we probably would not otherwise have attended Ameripex. As it was, we camped about 50 miles away, and commuted.

Ameripex was beyond belief! Imagine, if you can, 400 to 500 attending one of our shows! That would be fabulous, but the daily attendance at Ameripex was over 15,000! And people stayed all day! Thanks to my "Handicap" parking tag, we were able to park very near the entrance, rather than several blocks away as most were forced to do

Upon entering the "Great Hall" where the booths and displays were set up, we noticed a sort of "eerie glow" in the center of the room. As we approached the area, we found it to be eminating from the Soviet booth. Chernobyl radiation. ?

The show had its serious side, too Imagine, if you can, a trek of 3 1-2 miles just to to go from the start to finish of the displays to look at each one. STAMP OF THE MONTH

Our stamp this month is Scott #51 from the islands of Trinidad and Tobago, located in the West Indies. The two former British colonies joined together and gained their independence in 1976. This stamp is one of a series of 14 stamps issued in 1938. It is engraved and printed in light brown and ultramarine. The stamp is perforated 11½ x 11, and is watermarked with crown and script "CA" (which stands for Crown Agents), as shown in the illustration. This watermark will be sideways on this stamp. The scene it shows is the Agricultural College, with King George VI pictured in the border design. The other stamps in the series show various scenes of the islands.

NEW SWISS ISSUE

Switzerland issued in 1982 a new type of definitive stamp, showing landscapes with a different sign of the zodiac. Whenever the postage rate increased, additional stamps were issued, and now all twelve zodiac signs are used up. Therefore, a new set of definitives will be issued beginning September 9, 1986, showing Swiss postal history and operation. Six values will be released to the post offices after the old issue is used up.

Also to be released September 9 are four stamps honoring 1986 as the "International Peace Year" as designated by all UN members. Switzerland expects to issue 25 new stamps in 1986, with a total face value of Sfrs. 23.80 (about \$10 U.S.)

TENNESSEE CANCELS

by Bob Toal

The Tennessee Homecoming celebration has caused us to reflect on our Tennessee heritage. As we all remember, Tennessee Homecoming was the theme of our show this past March. During the show this theme was reinforced by historical and picture post card exhibits depicting Knoxville in days past. In addition, there was an award-winning Tennessee postal history display. This renewed sense of Tennessee awareness has prompted me to search through my files for Tennessee philatelic information. I came across several sources depicting fancy cancels, interesting town cancels, and slogan cancels. I've compiled those relating to Tennessee. Obviously the list is far from complete. Interested members with actual philatelic items or access to information from other reference sources please contact me at the meeting. As more information becomes available, I'll share it with the membership.

The origin of 19th century United States fancy cancels is unknown. Suffice to say that between 1850 and 1900 thousands of fancy or otherwise design cancels were used on the U.S. mails. Many of the obliterators used were cut from wood or cork presumably by local postmasters or their clerks. The resultant cancellations provide current philatelists with a wealth of material from which to collect.

The following list of 19th century fancy cancels and miscellaneous town postmarks was taken from Herman Herst, Jr. I've used the listing format presented in the text and have retained Herst's numbering system of cancel type. In the lists that follow, the cancel number corresponds to the number beside the cancel shown in the figures. In addition, the lists cite the stamp on which the cancel was frequently used, as well as the date on which the cancel was in use and the city of origin. (See Figures 1 and 2.) Next time I'll discuss 20th century fancy cancels.





But, DON'T DELAY getting that exhibit started because Knoxpex '87 is closer than you think.

I know you're saying to yourself "Well, I don't know how to put together an exhibit." It's EASY! If I can do it, I know you can. Just remember these few basic guidelines:

Every exhibit must have a title page. This includes the title, a statement of what you are trying to show in your exhibit, and your name if you wish.

Following comes the exhibit itself. It could be a single page out of one of your albums or several pages illustrating a single subject or topic.

The board is working very hard on this, and we would like to have an excellent turnout for the event. If you do not want to attend the banquet, you may still come to the auction. So mark your calendars, and save December 2 for this very special evening!

WHAT'S WRONG WITH THE POST OFFICE?

That's somewhat of a leading question and I'm sure that any one of you might have your own answers to it. But specifically, I'm speaking of our local post office's attitude toward the stamp collector.

It seems those in charge of setting policy and procedures at the new main post office have little use for the stamp collector. It's as though they regard us as second class citizens, barely worth recognition.

Of course, I agree that certain standards and regulations must be adhered to. But who's to say that a few simple amenities are going to hurt anyone when indeed everyone stands to gain in the process.

The case in point is this. The philatelic sales window at the new regional post office in Knoxville is being operated exclusively to meet the convenience of the Post Office. What I can't understand is, while they admit that philatelic sales represent a 90% profit, they resist any endeavor of persuasion to operate the philatelic window for the convenience of the philatelic customer.

We are not asking for that much. All we want is to be served by the USPS and treated equal to any other postal patron.

The problem stems from what I consider to be totally unreasonable hours of operation and a lack of flexability to make available the philatelic items the collecting community wants and demands. The philatelic window at this post office is open only eight hours a week. And not just any eight hours. Their hours are from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m., Tuesday through Friday. This is a time when I'd estimate that at least 90% of our near 100 stamp club members are at work or otherwise indisposed. And I'd say that there is probably at least that many or more stamp collectors in the Knoxville area, who are not club members, who either find these hours inconvenient or don't even know that the window exists.

I recently talked with the director of sales and customer services for the Knoxville area. I asked him to tell me why he couldn't adjust these hours to better accomodate us. His reply was he couldn't extend them any later into the day because it would interfere with people buying stamps and mailing letters (Those he has to provide a service for while we bring in 90% profit. Strange!). He also said that unless sales warranted it, he couldn't keep the window open more that the two hours a day, four days a week. Well, tell me this, hypothetically speaking, do you think McDonald's would expect sales of their hamburgers to increase if their hours of being open to the public were the same as the philatelic window at the Knoxville Post Office? I kind of doubt it!

There is one positive thing I can say however. From dealing with the window clerk myself and from talking to others who have, I've been left with a favorable impression of him. His name is Fred and he is kind, courteous, helpful, and seems to have a good working knowledge of stamp collecting. It's too bad however, that when Fred is not there, for any reason, there is no one to fill in for him. The window simply stays closed.

Finally, there are some large metropolitan areas that do have quite wonderful postiques or philatelic windows. Alot of these literally go out of their way to cater to the philatelic community. I only wish that the officials at the Knoxville Post Office would realize, as these others already have, just how good a thing they could really have if they only tried. I just don't know what it would take. Do you?

DECEMBER 2 LIVE AUCTION

If you have lots that you wish to enter in the December auction, please mount them on a plain $8\frac{1}{2}$ x 11 sheet of paper. (No silent auction strip) If you already have a seller's identification letter, put it at the top of the page. At the bottom of the page, be sure to give an accurate description of the lot. The description should consist of: Scott catalogue number, description of item or items, condition of item or items, and a catalogue value (state what catalogue is used for this). You may put a minimum bid on your lot. If you do so, make sure it is clearly stated on the sheet, also. If you put a minimum bid on your lot and it does not sell, you will be charged a fee of 10% of your minimum for handling. For items that sell, the club will take a 10% of the selling price as commission. There will be no buyer's fee.


If you want your lots to be listed in the December newsletter, you must bring them to the November meeting. You will be given a receipt for your lots. Lots may be submitted at the December meeting, also, but they will not be listed in the newsletter. This will be a <u>live</u> auction and should be a lot of fun. 
